Mad Men Recap: Meet the Mets

Hello, Trashies. This was a particularly stressful episode for me. Maybe it was all those venereal diseases floating around, but I was nervous the whole time. Or maybe I just need to down a quart of vodka ala Don Draper before I watch. Anyway, let's get to it, shall we?

Previously: Don returned to SC&P and nobody, least of all Lou, was happy to see him. Margaret creepily "forgave" Roger. Harry Crane lobbied for a computer. Don's many stipulations for return include no drinking on the job, having to take Lane's old office and reporting to Lou. Pete is dating a hot but possibly crazy real estate agent.

We open at a restaurant, where Pete is discussing vacation plans with Bonnie. She is distracted because some guy is looking at her.



Pete gets up to confront him, but it turns out to be a guy named George Payton who used to work for Vicks Chemical – the company Pete's father-in-law Tom works for. George left Vicks shortly after Tom had a heart attack (he's fine) to work for Burger Chef, which apparently is a real thing. George tells Pete that Burger Chef is unhappy and putting McCann under review and wouldn't it be fun to work together without having Tom in the way. He agrees to give Pete a call when he gets back east. Bonnie says she loves watching Pete work, but he says it's not a big deal because those convos happen all the time.

Don arrives at work to find the office empty. Upstairs, Harry Hamlin is announcing the arrival of the new computer, which will be installed in the creative lounge so all visitors to the office can see it.

Peggy says Lou doesn't believe in creative, because he doesn't know how to use it. Unfortunately, Lou is right behind Peggy when she says it. It's not clear if he heard, though. Lou says they will get more use out of the computer than the lounge.

Roger calls Don over to ask why he was late and Don says he never got a memo and has no idea what's going on. Roger says they are getting a computer to do lots of magical things – like make Harry Crane important. Roger admits the decision was made a the partner-level, but says it preceded Don's return. Downstairs, the creative team is disassembling the lounge while Ginsberg rails against Harry Crane. Stan says doesn't he believe in advertising? The partners (sans Don, plus Lou Avery) are having a coast-to-coast conference call. Pete tells them about the Burger Chef opportunity. Harry Hamlin tries to get Ted to come back to NYC to work on it, but Ted says he's not going anywhere.




I haven't stood up from this desk in three episodes. I'm not about to start now.

Roger says he was thinking the same thing. Don's been back at work for three weeks and hasn't been put on an account yet. Lou is none too happy with this development. After the call, Lou pulls Harry Hamlin aside and says he thought they had an understanding about Don. Harry Hamlin assures him there is nothing to worry about and says if nothing else, Don is an "exquisite copywriter." Lou says Don is going to implode and Harry Hamlin cackles that that is a "distinct possibility." On the other hand, he says, Lou might get some good work.

I was promised there'd only be mediocre work

Roger's secretary Caroline is playing with his grandson Ellery. She informs him that his (first) ex-wife and son-in-law are waiting for him in his office. When he walks in, Mona says that his daughter Margaret has run away. Roger: "to Bergdorf's?" Heh. But nope, Mona says she's upstate at some religious cult. I knew it!





Brooks says it's a commune. Mona says he doesn't know that and she can't get a straight story out of him. She says Margaret got in a van with some hippies one morning and she's been gone ten days. Never go to a second location with hippies, isn't that what they say? Brooks wants to go upstate to find her, and Roger agrees that he should. Mona thinks Roger should go since he is Margaret's father. Roger says everything will be fine.

Don's on his office couch reading the paper. There is a commotion outside his door, where the computer installation is underway. He goes outside to see what's going on and Harry Crane introduces him to Lloyd, the guy who owns LeaseTech, the company installing the computer.



Oh, but Lane's Mets pennant is hanging on the wall, so he obviously rescued it from the garbage at some point.




Q. How is this pennant like Lane?

Caroline reads Roger a message from Mona that says "Hey, Genius. Brooks is in jail in Kingston." Roger yells at her, just because.



Mathis is in Peggy's office blabbing about spaghetti. Peggy is clearly agitated because Don hasn't shown up for the meeting. Mathis offers to go get him. He finds Don at his desk playing solitaire.

I need a drink



Roger "Mud" amirite?


Roger says he understands why she'd want to stay there, but she is a mother and has to come home to her son. Roger asks how she can just leave her baby.
